4.2 Maintenancxe and Service Expenditures - Originalting Province/Territory

In requesting services from a receiving PT, an originating Ptagrees to directly pay for:

- In care maintenance and service costs at the receiving PT rates
  - Out of care maintenance and service costs at the originating PT's rate
- For Foster Care when Yukon is the originating PT Yukon pay receiving PT rates
  - For EFCA Yukon pays Yukon rates to caregovers

4.2 Maintenancxe and Service Expenditures - Originalting Province/Territory

In requesting services from a receiving PT, an originating Ptagrees to directly pay for:

- In care maintenance and service costs at the receiving PT rates

Children placed in OOT Foster Care are children that are deemed to be In-Care therefore the Yukon as per the Protocol pays the receiving jurisdictions rates for the child

4.2 Maintenancxe and Service Expenditures - Originalting Province/Territory

In requesting services from a receiving PT, an originating Ptagrees to directly pay for:

- Out of care maintenance and service costs at the originating PT's rate

Children placed in OOT EFCA arrangements are deemed not to be In-Care therefore the Yukon will pay to support the child at the same rate as if the child is placed in the Yukon

These rates are below

Basic Maintenance

- \$40.04 Whitehorse
- \$42.85 Rural Yukon
- \$73.82 Old Crow

The basic maintenance rate is indexed annually to the CPI (Consumer Price Index) and is intended to cover the following items:

- Household allowance – provision for laundry supplies, cleaning supplies, paper products and dry cleaning that are used for the child in care
- Bedding and linen – provision for towels, blankets, sheets, pillows, comforter and bedspread for the child
- Repairs, equipment and room maintenance – provision for increased wear and tear of furniture/furnishings due to addition of foster child and additional furnishings or equipment needed for child's use while in the home.

**Note:** Foster parents are normally expected to provide the furniture required for foster children. However, if this would create a financial hardship for the foster family, the branch may provide whatever equipment or furnishings that are needed, such as a bed, dresser or car seat, to enable a foster parent to accommodate the child. These equipment/furnishings remain the property of the government and are returned to the branch when the child moves.

- Utilities – provision for cost of heat, light, water related to an additional child in the home.
- Food – provision for all food purchases prepared in home, brought in or eaten out, including school lunches and regular formula for infants.

**Note:** If an infant is placed on an above average cost formula under the direction of a physician, additional financial coverage will be provided to meet the extra cost

- Eamily recreational outings – provision for child's outings with family including treats, tickets, etc.

#### Child care for a child in a placement resource

Daycare/day home service to a child in foster care will be charged at the standard (non-subsidized rate); the daycare/day home would bill the Child Care Unit directly who will code to the costs back to the Foster Care Unit. The worker must approve the use of the daycare/day home before the child is placed.

#### In home child care

When a babysitter is retained (also for reference information for children in care who have permission to do babysitting) the following rates for babysitting are allowed for compensation back to the placement resource. The rates indicated are basic minimum levels, a higher rate would be considered by the worker based on the needs/ages of the children and the qualifications of the baby sitter/caregiver. In such cases approval will be required as per Appendix 10. A relative baby sitter in the home (example, older sister) could be considered in certain circumstances as well.

#### Recreational activities and camps

Recreational costs in excess of what is allowable under the Children's Special Allowance and camp costs will be considered in reference to how these endeavors/activities improve the quality of life for the child, develop their own specific abilities/interests, and provide further opportunities for them to reach their developmental (social/cultural,



etc.) bench marks. Approval will be required as per Appendix 10.

**Graduation costs**

There may be many costs related to a graduation ceremony, consideration will vary dependent on age, program, culture, etc. Most costs are hard to pre-determine, related photographs/certificates are usually quantifiable at \$70.00-\$100.00 and fees usually don't usually exceed \$150.00. Approval will be required as per Appendix 10.

**Death of a child in care burial expenses, remembrance**

Costs are very standardized for funeral expenses in the Yukon, some discretion will be given for family, cultural, and related considerations. Approval will be required as per Appendix 10.

Children in care participating in funeral and grieving ceremonies will be given some assistance for a wreath or other similar cultural remembrance. All costs for them to attend and participate in such arrangements will be covered. Approval will be required as per Appendix 10

**Worker expenditures on children in care**

When workers purchase meals or gifts for children in care, the following expenditures are submitted on a petty cash requisition form, including:

- when taking a child for lunch/dinner or snack:
  - ☐ maximum \$15.00 for a meal up to 4 times per year to a maximum total of \$60.00 (tips will not be reimbursed)
  - ☐ snack/drink: maximum of \$5.00 per child
- when purchasing a gift for a child:
  - ☐ in a foster home: up to \$30.00 for birthday
  - ☐ at residential group home: up to \$30.00 for birthday and
  - ☐ independent living: birthday and Christmas gifts according to the foster care rates
- on graduation and child leaving continuing custody
  - ☐ a gift up to a maximum of \$60.00
- for a cultural ceremonial offering:
  - ☐ up to a maximum of \$50.00 and maximum of once per year

**Children in care gift giving to others**

When a child in care purchases gifts for their siblings, parents, friends, etc. including children who are in a residential group home or independent living, they are to use their Children's Special Allowance money, which is their own. If a child in care is in a foster home, the foster family may apply some of the Children's Special Allowance money for these requests

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#### Medications/prescriptions

All medications/prescriptions prescribed by a physician will be covered. All essential non-prescription medicines or health accessories will be covered. Children enrolled in the Children's Drug and Optical Program (CDOP) are eligible for prescription drugs and the following medical supplies:

- Surgical and burn dressings
- Scabicide, (a medication used to treat scabies)
- Pediculicide (a medication used to treat lice and scabies)
- Anaphylaxis emergency treatment kits

#### Dental and orthodontic care

Children will be enrolled in the free school based dental program. Dental services provided by Yukon Children's Dental Program are supplied at no cost to the parent or guardian. They are covered by Yukon Health and Social Services.

In communities that do not have a resident dentist, home-school children and students from Kindergarten to Grade 12 are eligible for services from the Yukon Children's Dental Program.

In order for a child to be a part of this program, a Yukon Children's Dental Program enrollment form must be signed by the parent or the worker.

The supervisor will request an estimate of required orthodontic work, specialized treatment beyond the average orthodontic care for children requiring this would need the manager/director's approval.

The worker may authorize the cost of the dental examination. An estimate with dental work required needs to be obtained from the dentist; the worker will submit this to the supervisor for consideration.

#### Eye care

All essential optical care prescribed by a physician/optometrist at the frequency recommended will be covered. A child used to using contact lenses when entering into care or custody would not be required to switch to glasses.

The worker when assisting a child to pick frames would seek to balance good economy with aesthetic appearance appropriate to the child's age.

For optical costs coverage procedure see Appendix 10.

Children enrolled in the Children's Drug and Optical Program (CDOP) are eligible for:

- One eye examination every two years,
- Glasses every two years to a maximum of \$200.00 and
- Contact lenses where recommended for medical reasons.

#### Passports

Passport costs include photos, the Government of Canada Passport Fee, any additional documents required such as birth certificates or Notary Public Fees

#### Therapies to meet developmental needs and education assessment

If a specialist is assessed as needed by the worker (example psychologist, education psychologist, counselor, speech language therapist, etc.) for assessment, treatment, development benchmarks, etc. and the worker has:

- Determined the service is not available free in existing services
- Secondary where applicable corroboration of the need, example a physician referral
- Reviewed branch/department(s)/Contract Administration for lists of registered professionals or chosen a qualified professional with rationale for the choice, the service may be covered at a rate commensurate with what the branch/department(s) pay for comparable services.

#### Tutoring

If a tutor is assessed as needed by the worker and the worker has:

- Determined the service is not available free in existing services
- Secondary where applicable corroboration of the need, example a n educational psychologist
- Reviewed branch/department(s)/Contract Administration for lists of registered professionals or chosen a qualified tutor with rationale for the choice, the service may be covered at a rate commensurate with what the branch/department(s) pay for comparable services

#### Escort for medical, special assistance

Costs will be considered in addition to the basic transportation/accommodation costs given by the department under Medical Travel for one escort, for an additional escort where deemed essential by the worker, to be covered in accordance with departmental travel rates and small entertainment costs for a child where the worker deems it necessary for quality of life/comfort for the child. A foster care parent receives hotel/taxi/per diem/mileage at the government rate at the discretion/approval of the worker and with approval by the
