WHITEHORSE—Two Yukon government employees were recently awarded the 2012 Aboriginal Employees Award of Honour. The awards were presented by Elaine Taylor, Minister responsible for the Public Service Commission, at the 5th annual year-end gathering of the Aboriginal Employees Forum.

The recipients of the 2012 Aboriginal Employees Award of Honour are: Roberta Sembsmoen, an employee with Energy, Mines and Resources Client Services and Inspections in Haines Junction; and Helen Gartner, a First Nations Liaison Worker at Copper Ridge Place in the Department of Health and Social Services.

"The Aboriginal Employees Award of Honour recognizes the accomplishments of outstanding Aboriginal employees in the Yukon government," Minister responsible for the Public Service Commission Elaine Taylor said. "I was honoured to present the 2012 award to these employees whose work in the public service has made remarkable contributions to our community."

The Aboriginal Employees Award of Honour was established in 2009 through the Aboriginal Employees Forum. The forum works to increase the recruitment and retention of Aboriginal employees in the Yukon government and is guided by the Final Agreement–Representative Public Service Plan.

One of Gartner's most remarkable achievements is the life celebration ceremonies that she performs with skill and compassion. The ceremonies give residents, staff and family members time to pause and honour each person who passes away.

Her nominators say her kind and gentle way makes people feel respected and cared for. She was described as a valued team member who is admired and respected by everyone. She also provides guidance and support to many staff.
