First Nations Language Proficiency program celebrates its first graduates

WHITEHORSE – Eight graduates recently celebrated their graduation from the First Nations Language Proficiency Program, delivered in partnership by the Department of Education and Simon Fraser University (SFU).

"The Department of Education is committed to supporting First Nations language programming in our public schools," Education Minister Patrick Rouble said. "First Nations Language Proficiency Programs are important to ensure we have educators with the language proficiency required to be able to teach our students."

Two learners, Colleen Joe-Titus (Southern Tutchone) and Sharon Shadow (Southern Tutchone), received post-baccalaureate diplomas in Arts and Sciences. Six learners, Nancy Sterriah (Kaska), Georgina Stone (Southern Tutchone), Connie Jules (Tlingit), Bess Cooley, (Tlingit), Kathy Magun (Kaska), and Melissa Hawkins (Han), received Certificates in First Nations Language Proficiency.

"SFU is very proud of its long-standing history of engagement, collaboration, and partnership with First Nations peoples and communities," Marianne Ignace, an associate professor of Anthropology and First Nations Studies said. "SFU is committed to working with First Nations communities to enable their members to learn and re-learn their languages, most of which are in a precarious state. Through a new Centre for First Nations Languages, in partnership with communities, we hope to develop collaborative research that will advance First Nations language learning and teaching."

The programs are delivered remotely in Whitehorse and Yukon communities through a combination of coursework and master-apprentice immersion complemented by fluent speaking mentors in the communities. Emma Sam (Tlingit), Josephine Acklack (Kaska), Mabel Henry (Han), Bess Cooley (Tlingit), Lorraine Allen (Southern Tutchone), and Hazel Bunbury (Southern Tutchone) served as student mentors.

"I commend the learners and the mentors for their dedication and commitment to keeping our First Nations languages and cultures alive," Rouble added. "Their efforts will benefit future generations."
