- There are 42 Government of Yukon campgrounds with more than 1,000 campsites across the territory.
- The top 10 undiscovered campgrounds include Drury Creek, Lapie Canyon, Nunatuk, Tatchun Lake, Quiet Lake South, Simpson Lake, Watson Lake, Million Dollar Falls, Moose Creek and Lake Creek.
