Community art projects supported through Arts Fund

WHITEHORSE—Twelve Yukon organizations are receiving a total of \$141,604 in funding from the Yukon government for projects encouraging participation in the arts and community engagement.

"Projects supported by Arts Fund provide many opportunities to take part in the territory's vibrant cultural scene," Minister of Tourism and Culture Mike Nixon said. "Whether they are creating art, learning new skills or enjoying a performance as audience members, Yukoners of all ages are building stronger relationships and communities through their participation in these activities and events."

Mellisa Murray and Zoe Verhees are receiving \$8,000 to produce Brave New Works, a multidisciplinary performance called Colours. Murray and Verhees are collaborating with Claire Ness who will mentor the producers, and with local playwright and dramaturge Celia McBride who will provide advice and critique performers.

"We are excited to be reviving Brave New Works and providing a unique forum for both established and emerging artists to showcase new and experimental work," Murray said. "Together with Claire and Celia we will produce an original, professional performance featuring Yukon talent."

"We also hope to have participants from as many artistic disciplines and communities as possible," Verhees added. "When Colours is performed in March 2014, audiences will have an opportunity to provide feedback to the artists who can then develop their work further."

Kluane First Nation members will be creating a mural with \$15,323 in support from the Arts Fund. The project will include a series of workshops by artists and Elders to provide instruction, inspiration and guidance to participating community members.

"The project encourages people of all ages and all levels of artistic ability to work with each other through workshops to create a vibrant expression of art. A mural will be developed with skilled artisans to be showcased in the heart of Burwash Landing," Kluane First Nation executive director Roberta Martell said. "The project will engage the whole community in celebrating our arts and cultural traditions, honouring our ancestors and homeland, and looking forward to a bright future."

The Arts Fund supports projects that foster the development of the arts in Yukon communities. The next application deadline is December 15.
