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Strong Yukon delegation attends fourth National Aboriginal Women's Summit in Nova Scotia

MEMBERTOU—The Minister responsible for the Women's Directorate Elaine Taylor and several Yukon First Nations women represented Yukon at the fourth National Aboriginal Women's Summit (NAWS) co-hosted by the Government of Nova Scotia and the Native Women's Association of Canada on October 20 to 22.

"The theme of NAWS IV—Promoting Equity, Empowerment and Leadership of Aboriginal Women—focused on action, solutions, and moving forward collectively," Taylor said. "For Yukon, the summit provided an opportunity to highlight and share the important work being undertaken by Aboriginal women's organizations in partnership with government to develop culturally relevant initiatives developed by and for Aboriginal women to address issues affecting Aboriginal women in the north."

The Government of Yukon and the Yukon Advisory Council on Women's Issues co-hosted regional summits in 2007 and 2012. Since then Yukon Aboriginal women's organizations have undertaken significant work to implement recommendations from those and previous national summits. Projects include community-based work with the RCMP and other agencies in the prevention of violence including: supporting victim-based programming; raising awareness of missing and murdered Aboriginal women through the "Sisters in Spirit" initiative; developing an Aboriginal women and leadership project and engaging men and boys through the "Brothers in Spirit" initiative.

During the summit, Aboriginal women were asked to provide feedback on the recommendations and implementation of initiatives identified in previous national summits. They were also asked to help guide the development of a national socio-economic action plan for ensuring Aboriginal women achieve equity to that of other women in Canada. A meeting of premiers, ministers, national Aboriginal organization leaders and officials was also held to discuss planning for a national roundtable on missing and murdered Aboriginal women.

The Native Women's Association of Canada, together with the province of Newfoundland and Labrador, hosted the first NAWS in 2007 which resulted in recommendations to improve the social and economic conditions of Aboriginal women and their families. NAWS II was held in 2008 in the Northwest Territories and focused on health, safety, wellness, equality and empowerment. Held in Manitoba in 2012, NAWS III focused on honouring murdered and missing Aboriginal women.
