New doctors boost healthcare opportunities for Yukoners this October

Joint recruitment efforts by the Government of Yukon and the Yukon Hospital Corporation will result in additional medical services for Yukoners this October.

Two new physicians are moving to Yukon: Dr. Curtis Myden, an orthopaedic surgeon, and Dr. Katharine Smart, a pediatrician.

Dr. Myden will be based in the surgeon's clinic at the Whitehorse General Hospital, while Dr. Smart will be based in Klondyke Medical Clinic.

- Yukon's wait time for orthopaedic referrals is currently double the national average. The arrival of Dr. Myden should reduce the number of patients waiting for an orthopedic referral by up to 70 percent.
- Dr. Curtis Myden is an orthopaedic surgeon with a sub-specialty interest and training in Shoulder and Knee Arthroscopic surgery and Pediatric orthopaedics. As a former Canadian Olympic swimmer, he has a special interest in helping injured athletes return to their sport.
- Dr. Katharine Smart has completed fellowships in both Pediatric Emergency Medicine and Pediatric Trauma. She has a passion for medical education and health initiatives that support underserved populations, and has previously worked in the Pediatric Intensive Care and Emergency Medicine Units at Alberta Children's Hospital, Royal Children's Hospital Melbourne, and at BC Women's Hospital.
