## 2020 Arctic Winter Games contract signed

Minister of Community Services John Streicker, Whitehorse Mayor Dan Curtis and Arctic Winter Games International Committee vice-president John Rodda signed the 2020 Arctic Winter Games contract yesterday. The contract signing was held at the first Business After-Hours event of the fall, co-hosted by the Whitehorse Chamber of Commerce.

The contract solidifies the Government of Yukon's agreement with the City of Whitehorse to host the 2020 games. The games are expected to have numerous economic and social benefits for the territory, and will also promote sport development amongst Yukon youth.

The Arctic Winter Games is an international, multi-sport event for young northern athletes to compete against their peers from across the circumpolar region. The event is a place for athletes to grow and develop, and to learn from northern, Arctic and Indigenous cultures.

- This will be the seventh time Whitehorse has hosted the Arctic Winter Games. Whitehorse most recently hosted in 2012.
- Over 2,000 athletes will compete in a number of sports, including biathlon, cross country skiing, Dene games and snowshoeing. Each team will also send a cultural contingent.
- Participants come from across the circumpolar region and represent nine different contingents, including Alaska, Nunavut, Greenland and Yamal.
