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Partnership to assess geothermal resources

The Ta'an Kwäch'än Council, Da Daghay Development Corporation, in partnership with the Yukon Geological Survey, is undertaking a study of geothermal heat flow in the Whitehorse area. The multidisciplinary study will provide some of the information needed to assess potential geothermal energy opportunities in the territory. One component of the project involves drilling a deep monitoring well to directly measure ground temperature.

Drilling of the well is underway at a site about three kilometres west of the Takhini Hot Springs on Settlement Land of the Ta'an Kwäch'än Council. Down-hole temperatures will be monitored for up to a year in partnership with the Da Daghay Development Corporation to determine geothermal gradient in this location.

Funding for the project is through the Government of Yukon and the Government of Canada.

Quick facts

- The drilling started October 30 and will take up to three weeks; then a thermistor string will be installed down-hole to measure ground temperature for up to one year.
- Ground temperature data will be available to the public as the project progresses.
- The site will be remediated immediately after the temperature monitoring is complete; only a small well cap will remain after remediation.
- Project funding from the Government of Canada is provided through the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency (CanNor) as part of a larger investment in northern geoscience projects.
