YUKON TOURISM VISITATION REPORT FEBRUARY 2015

The Yukon Tourism Visitation Report is produced monthly and comprises key indicators of tourism, including visitation estimates, border crossings, visits to Visitor Information Centers and airplane passenger volumes.

HIGHLIGHTS

In February 2015:

- An estimated 9,100 people visited Yukon; an increase of 8% compared to February 2014.
- Border crossings through Canadian Border Services Agency ports of entry increased 16% (408 people) over February 2014.
- Air arrivals at Erik Nielson Whitehorse International Airport were up 14% compared to February 2014.

Year-to-date (January to February) 2015:

- Estimated visitation to Yukon was 17,900; an increase of 3% compared to the same period last year.
- Total border crossings were up 11% (595 people) compared to the same period in 2014.
- Air passengers arriving at Erik Nielson Whitehorse International Airport were up 6% compared to the same period in 2014.

YUKON MONTHLY TOURISM INDICATORS: YUKON VISITOR TRACKING PROGRAM

Calculated by Tourism Yukon, the Yukon Visitor Tracking Program (YVTP) provides an estimate of the number of visitors entering Yukon. The YVTP is a volumetric model, which includes border crossings, highway traffic counts, train passenger volumes and air passenger volumes. The model excludes Yukon residents.


An estimated 9,100 people visited Yukon in February 2015. This represents an increase of approximately 700 people, or 8% compared to February 2014.

Year-to-Date

17,900

An estimated 17,900 people visited Yukon from January to February 2015. This represents an increase of approximately 500 people, or 3% compared to the same period last year.

February 2015


- In February 2015, 408 (16%)
 more people crossed into Yukon
 through a Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) port of entry
 than in February 2014.
- Increases were seen among:
 - Americans (18%);
 - Overseas travellers (10%);
 and
 - Canadians (126%).
- Of the border crossings:
 - 75% (2,264 people) were non -Yukoners; and
 - 25% (745 people) were Yukoners.
- Excluding Yukoners, border crossings increased 23% (425 people) in February 2015 compared to February 2014.

Private vehicles include people in automobiles, cyclists, and pedestrians.

Year-to-Date (January to February) 2015

- Year-to-date, 5,790 people have crossed the border into Yukon, an increase of 11% (595 people) over the same period in 2014.
- Excluding Yukoners, 4,351 people have crossed the border year-to-date, an increase of 16% (610 people) over 2014.


- Comparing February 2014 to February 2015, increases in border crossings were seen at:
 - Beaver Creek, up 27% (279 people); and
 - Pleasant Camp, up 36% (210 people).
- Beaver Creek was the busiest border crossing in February 2015, with 44% of all border crossings; however 11% of those were Yukoners.
- The port of entry with the highest proportion of Yukoners in February 2015 was Fraser (54% of all people crossing at that port were Yukoners).

- Year-to-date, compared to the same time period in 2014, total land crossings have increased by 12%.
- Year-to-date, Beaver Creek has been the busiest border crossing, with 43% of all year-to-date border crossings; however, 13% of those were Yukoners.




Year-to-date (January to February) 2015

- Year-to-date, excluding Canadians, 4,058 people entered Yukon through CBSA ports of entry. Of those:
 - 43% stayed one day; and
 - 57% stayed one or more nights.
- Of the 2,315 people who entered Yukon for one or more nights, year-todate:
 - 94% were American; and
 - 6% were from overseas.


