YUKON TOURISM VISITATION REPORT SEPTEMBER 2016

The Yukon Tourism Visitation Report is produced monthly and comprises key indicators of tourism, including visitation estimates, border crossings, visits to Visitor Information Centers and airplane passenger volumes.

HIGHLIGHTS

In September 2016:

- Border crossings through Canadian Border Services Agency ports of entry decreased 1% (326 people) over September 2015.
- Air arrivals at Erik Nielson Whitehorse International Airport were up 6% compared to September 2015.

Year-to-date (January to September) 2016:

- Total border crossings were up 2% compared to the same period in 2015.
- Air passengers arriving at Erik Nielson Whitehorse International Airport were up 8% compared to the same period in 2015.





YUKON MONTHLY TOURISM INDICATORS: BORDER CROSSINGS

Provided by Canada Border Services Agency, the data reports the volume of people entering Canada through designated land or air ports of entry. Figures do not include people travelling in commercial vehicles, by train or marine traffic.

September 2016


- In September 2016, 326 (-2%) fewer people crossed into Yukon through a Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) port of entry than in September 2015.
- Of the total border crossings:
 - 89% (35,714 people) were non-Yukoners; and
 - 11% (4,197 people) were Yukoners.
- Excluding Yukoners, border crossings decreased 3% (-1,099 people) in September 2016 compared to September 2015.

Private vehicles include people in automobiles, cyclists, and pedestrians.

Year-to-Date (January to September) 2016

- Year-to-date, 319,000 people have crossed the border into Yukon, an increase of 2% (5,830 people) over the same period in 2015.
- Excluding Yukoners, border crossings increased 1% over 2015.

Canada Border Services Agency Ports of Entry

September 2016

- Comparing September 2016 to September 2015, increases in border crossings were seen at:
 - Beaver Creek, up 26% (2,020 people);
 - Little Gold, up 5% (72 people); and
 - Pleasant Camp, up 33% (987 people).
- Fraser was the busiest border crossing in September 2016, with 59% of all border crossings; however 14% of those were Yukoners.



Year-to-Date (January to September) 2016

- Year-to-date, compared to the same time period in 2015, total land crossings have increased by 2%.
- Year-to-date, Fraser has been the busiest border crossing, with 61% of all year-to-date border crossings; however, 12% of crossing at that border have been Yukoners.




- Year-to-date, excluding Canadians, 251,960 people entered Yukon through CBSA ports of entry. Of those:
 - 60% stayed one day; and
 - 40% stayed one or more nights.
- Of the 100,044 people who entered Yukon for one or more nights, year-to -date:
 - 81% were American; and
 - 19% were from overseas.

- eptember 2016, 25,994 ericans crossed the border Yukon. Of those:
 - 2% stayed one day; and
 - 18% stayed one or more ights.
- he 6,053 overseas travellers ross the border into Yukon in tember 2016:
 - 55% stayed one day; and
 - 15% stayed one or more ights.

YUKON MONTHLY TOURISM INDICATORS: VISITOR INFORMATION CENTERS

Provided by Tourism Yukon, Visitor Services unit, the data reports an estimate of visitation to Yukon Visitor Information Centres (VICs). Depending on the VIC, visitation estimates are calculated using either guestbook signatures (Beaver Creek, Haines Junction, and Watson Lake) or electronic door counters (Whitehorse, Carcross, and Dawson City).


