
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#### **DEPARTMENTAL OBJECTIVE**

- To ensure that the renewable resources and the environment of the Yukon are managed and used in accordance with government policy by:
  - maintaining and enhancing the quality of the Yukon's environment for present and future generations through ecosystem-based management, conservation of resources and protection and maintenance of biodiversity;
  - implementing the Yukon Protected Areas Strategy, and the principles of the Yukon Conservation Strategy;
  - ensuring that Yukon people have the opportunity to be involved in the development and review of departmental programs, policies, legislation and regulations through open and effective communication and processes;
  - managing renewable resources in a manner that promotes integration with other sectors such as economic development, so that optimum benefits can be derived for all Yukon people;
  - participating in national and international measures designed to enhance environmental quality and encourage sustainable use of renewable resources;
  - integrating, implementing and managing additional authorities and responsibilities in areas of renewable resources and environmental management as they are devolved from the Government of Canada, that are consistent with the Government of the Yukon's policy and constitutional objectives; and
  - undertaking resource management activities that meet the Government of the Yukon's obligations and respect the rights of aboriginal people and relationships established through land claim and self-government agreements.

### RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN ORGANIZATION AND PROGRAMS







## **PROGRAM OBJECTIVES**

- To develop and provide management and protection of Yukon's environment through education, regulation development, monitoring and inspections, assessment and mitigation of resource developments, and pollution prevention programs.
- To implement the Yukon Protected Areas Strategy.
- To establish and manage a system of protected areas including wilderness preserves, territorial
  parks, ecological reserves, Canadian Heritage Rivers, campgrounds and recreation sites; and to
  provide information/interpretive services for Yukon residents and visitors.
- To develop and enhance public awareness and understanding of, and adherence to the laws pertaining to renewable resources and the environment, through education, monitoring, inspection and enforcement.
- To provide public education respecting Yukon's environment, resources and public safety.
- To provide regional delivery of departmental services.
- To develop and implement management programs to maintain biological diversity and to ensure the conservation and sustainable use of fish, wildlife and habitat resources.
- To promote an agricultural industry that provides economic benefits to the Yukon in an environmentally sustainable fashion, while reflecting broad social values.
