Diverse Yukon Arts Projects Receive Valuable Support

WHITEHORSE – The Department of Tourism and Culture Arts Fund is contributing \$138,735 to 19 recipients with exciting and diverse artistic goals, announced Tourism and Culture Minister Elaine Taylor.

"The applicants in this intake show the variety of artistic excellence in Yukon," Taylor said. "We see photography, theatre, dance, pottery, First Nations carving, music and unique events which combine many of these disciplines."

An excellent example is the Whitehorse Boys and Girls Club project, When the Circus Comes to Town. The Vancouver Circus School will conduct a variety of workshops in Whitehorse this summer, culminating in a public event with Whitehorse youth and circus professionals performing together. Yukoners can expect an unusual treat with contortionists, ribbon dancers, yoyo champions and flying trapeze artists.

"We are extremely grateful for the Arts Fund," Whitehorse Boys and Girls Club programmer Dave Blottner said. "This opportunity simply could not happen without it. Yukon youth have gained valuable work experience in leading this project and will have an amazing opportunity for physical and creative learning in this summer's workshops."

The Arts Fund is an applicant-driven funding program that supports artists and communities in creative endeavours such as festivals, events, training and art creation in all forms. The fund is adjudicated four times a year by the Yukon Arts Advisory Council in an arms-length process.
