### Performing, Visual and Literary Artists to Share Advanced Artist Award

WHITEHORSE – Tourism and Culture Minister Elaine Taylor announced 11 Yukon artists will share \$40,000 in funding to further their artistic development and create new works.

"The Yukon government is pleased to support the further advancement of artists who have shown commitment and continue to evolve their practice," Taylor said. "Yukon's thriving and dynamic artistic community enriches the lives of Yukoners and attracts new visitors north."

Funding recipient Nadine Landry will travel to Louisiana to study Cajun music and explore the rich cultural dimensions of her journey.

"My Acadian roots in Canada can be traced directly to the people there. Many escaped with only their songs and stories," Landry said. "Thanks to this funding, I can learn from the best, immerse myself in the heritage and bring both the music and culture back home."

Upon her return, Landry will be sharing what she learns with other musicians, with French language school programs and will be happy to see more Yukoners two-stepping to Cajun music in the future.

Closer to home, 20-year veteran of the visual arts Meshell Melvin is excited to bring her knowledge of form and colour to the world of animation.

"I am very grateful for the door this funding opens," Melvin said. "I'm learning to use two-dimensional stop motion photography to bring my work to life. It will be interesting to see what arrives on film with a long and diverse history of visual arts."

The Advanced Artist Award program is funded by Lotteries Yukon and is administered by the Department of Tourism and Culture. Applications are reviewed by a jury of peers. The next intake for the Advanced Artist Award will be October 1.
