

2027 WHITEHORSE CANADA WINTER GAMES BID

Almost two decades after hosting the 2007 Canada Winter Games, the Yukon is preparing for the next chapter in our Canada Games experience: potential host of the 2027 Canada Winter Games. The Whitehorse Bid Committee is pleased to share with the City of Whitehorse and the Government of Yukon this summary of our recommendations for hosting the 2027 Games. Our recommendations are mindful of the need to ensure that a Yukon Games will bring long-term benefits to Yukoners.

DESCRIPTION OF

The 2027 Canada Winter Games will be a national-class sporting event that brings Canada's most promising young athletes to the Yukon for two weeks of competition and cultural exchange. To host the nation's largest multi-sport games, Whitehorse must meet criteria and standards established by the Canada Games Council. If approved, Yukon will host 2,000 athletes each week, plus up to 2,000 mission staff, coaches, guests and media. The Host Society will depend on a local army of volunteers to stage high level competitions, care for our visitors, and serve 7,000 meals a day.

Shared Values and Lasting Legacies

The Canada Games strengthen the fabric of Canada through the power of sport. Creating transformative legacies changes lives and invigorates communities. The 2027 Yukon bid focuses on creating significant infrastructure, economic and social benefits for Yukoners. We are committed to ensuring a first-rate experience for the thousands of athletes and their families who will join us from across Canada. Our bid centres on the principles of reconciliation, connection and resilience.

Housing

We recommend that the Games Village be at Yukon University, as it was in 2007. The bid committee is exploring options for construction of new athlete accommodation that will become affordable residences after the Games. Housing is a critical issue in Whitehorse. The 2027 Games can be a catalyst for building new residences to help address the city-wide pressure on available affordable housing.





Sports Complex

To deliver on our proposed 2027 Games commitments, Whitehorse needs a large new indoor facility with an ice sheet and capacity to host the opening and closing ceremonies. A venue of this scale would create unprecedented opportunities for future sports and cultural events. In addition to a new complex, the Yukon would benefit substantially from other sport facility upgrades that are needed for the 2027 Games.

Arctic Sports and Dene Games

The bid committee is recommending including Arctic Sports and Dene Games in the 2027 sports roster. Their inclusion in the Yukon Games would build capacity, awareness and pride in these cultural mainstays of northern sport. This initiative builds on our Arctic Winter Games experience and showcases Indigenous sports to Canadians.

First Nations Sports Trust Fund

Building on a trust fund initiative in 2007, the 2027 Games Bid Committee proposes to expand the legacy fund dedicated to supporting Yukon First Nations athletes. Our goal is a \$1 million trust fund to promote and support Indigenous sports and athletes.

National Arts & Culture Showcase

A Yukon Games would feature a robust program of northern talent and entertainment rooted in the cultures of our First Nation people. Building on the tremendous success of our 2007 cultural program and the Gathering of Northern Nations, we propose to work with partners to create a special entertainment initiative that highlights the diversity and extraordinary talent here in the North, alongside national cultural and performing arts talent.

Whole-Yukon Approach

We want to ensure that the benefits and opportunities from hosting the 2027 Winter Games are shared with all Yukoners, and we want our visitors to feel like a Games held in Whitehorse feels like a Yukon Games. With community outreach, partnerships, inclusion and great ideas, we see opportunities for surrounding communities and municipalities to play an important role in the Games.

Connection

As this bid is being written, we are keenly aware of the need for building community cohesion. We face myriad challenges as we collectively navigate a complex future, and we know from experience that hosting a Games builds togetherness, reduces social barriers, and encourages cooperation. Hosting a Winter Games together would create friendships and shared experiences that would make us stronger.

Storytelling

We're exploring the interface between broadcast, sponsorship and marketing and engaging with media specialists to understand the opportunities ahead. We envision a Games that will be a platform for telling stories about northern and Indigenous youth who can become heroes in their communities, and stories about youth from across Canada who are adventuring north. Through streaming and broadcast, Canadians can watch competitions, highlights and events coverage.





Showcase the Yukon

Hosting the 2027 Canada Winter Games is an opportunity to showcase our vibrant and growing territory to the rest of Canada. Marketing initiatives can also build local pride and momentum for the Games. If our bid is successful, we recommend promoting the Yukon as a premier choice for Canadians to live, work, compete and train, and experience. The Yukon stirs the soul for many Canadians, and our people and places help create lasting, life-shaping memories.

Sponsor Relationships

Meeting sponsorship targets is a challenge for any Games bid. For the 2007 Games, the Yukon pioneered a national, long-term sponsor focus and we propose to build on this outreach and those relationships and work closely with the Canada Games Council. Despite its size, our community has a strong record of support from local and regional sponsors who become vital Friends of the Games.

Dear Mayor Cabott and Whitehorse Councillors,

It was good meeting with you last Wednesday to discuss your support for the upcoming Canada Winter Games.

The benefits to the city and territory of hosting the Canada Winter Games not just economically but also in terms of First Nations reconciliation along with significant housing and recreational infrastructure investment cannot be understated. This is an enormous opportunity for our citizens to benefit from legacies similar to those we saw from the original Canada Games Centre in 2007.

The 2027 Canada Winter Games will feature the Yukon on the national stage, presenting a significant opportunity to highlight the territory, our athletes, and First Nations culture, while highlighting the benefits of First Nations self-governance and demonstrating ways to advance reconciliation. Through this opportunity, we can embrace, for the first time, the importance of First Nations in the Canada Winter Games, and there is no better place to do this than in the Yukon.

We will also build more affordable housing for the territory and will see recreation opportunities expand through the construction of an ice rink, court and assembly space capable of seating up to 4,000 people. Both of these benefits will allow us to better meet the needs of our growing population.

As discussed, the cost of staging this national event is substantial, but, accounting for inflation, not substantially different from the financial investment the city, territory and federal governments made in the lead up to the 2007 Canada Winter Games.

As you know through your significant efforts preparing the bid, Whitehorse requires a fourth ice sheet to hold the event, a facility capable of staging the opening and closing ceremonies and an

athletes' village with access to meeting areas and an industrial kitchen capable of serving thousands of athletes and support staff 20 hours a day.

The joint bid we prepared includes a complex for athletes' housing adding significant affordable housing options after the two-week event.

That bid also includes a new rink to bring the fourth ice sheet to the city and an event space capable of staging the opening and closing ceremonies and then large cultural events in the city thereafter.

We are also working closely with First Nations to bring wondrous new sports, culture and reconciliation measures into this national celebration.

As we discussed, the federal, territorial and city investment will be significant, but it is achievable by working together. I have formally requested \$138 million in support Government of Canada. The Yukon government is prepared to invest \$49 million.

In 2007, the city of Whitehorse invested roughly \$8.4 million in games infrastructure and operational costs. A comparable investment towards the 2027 games from the City of Whitehorse would be in the neighbourhood of \$17 million.

Given the growth in the city over the last decade and the benefits accruing from significant legacy recreation and housing projects in coming from this national event we agreed to co-host, I would appreciate your commitment to a strong financial investment in the Games. That commitment will open significant economic, social cultural and recreational opportunities to your citizens over the coming decades.

The Whitehorse Bid Committee shared plans to submit a comprehensive community information package on September the 23rd (CKRW 12 pm)

The final stage of confirming commitments for the 2027 Canada Winter Games bid to Whitehorse was announced today. The Whitehorse Bid Committee shared plans to submit a comprehensive community information package to the Canada Games Council on September the 23rd. The package will contain the plan sports information on a \$1 million trust fund for post-games to promote and support Indigenous sports and athletes, details on the construction of a new sport complex and more, in addition to the expected legacy infrastructure and affordable housing to be developed. It is anticipated hat the Games will draw more than 3,600 participants to the Yukon and generate between \$80-110 million in economic activity.

A suspected bomb near Upper Liard was in fact only a downrigger weight (CKRW 12 pm)

What was believed to be a World War II bomb was actually a downrigger weight. Yukon RCMP, Canadian Armed Forces and an explosive disposal

unit was sent to the shore along the Liard River, near Upper Liard, after a resident found the suspected bomb. The object, however, at no point served as a threat to anyone as the 50-pound oval-shaped metal object with fins attached was actually a downrigger weight used to hold fishing lines in deep water. A member of RCMP states that this is the first time for police. However, CAF have encountered similar occurrences.

Councillor Ted Laking raised concerns again about the City of Whitehorse's budget (CKRW 12 pm)

Concerns were raised during this week's Whitehorse City Council meeting as financial pressures on taxpayers increase. The city's budget is raising alarms as the budget is predicted to be already over-budget with several different projects happening. This isn't the first time Councillor Ted Laking made comments regarding the project as back in January, Laking first raised concerns about the amount budgeted for fuel and propane and if it's enough. Whitehorse is now anticipated to exceed the initial budget by just over \$300,000, in addition to the \$459,000 spent on snow removal, which was not planned originally.

Paul Deuling's lawyer began cross-examining the complainant yesterday (CBC 12:30 pm)

The trial continues for a former Whitehorse teacher accused of sexual assault. Paul Deuling faces charges stemming from allegations that date back to the eighties. Yesterday, his lawyer began cross-examining the complainant. A former student alleges Deuling took advantage of his position of trust, sexually assaulting her multiple times, including during her grade 12 year. The defence hopes to paint a different picture. During cross-examination, Deuling's lawyer suggested the woman was in a relationship with Deuling. He also questioned her memory of key dates. The woman's name is covered by a publication ban. The trial continues tomorrow.

The 2027 Canada Winter Games Bid Committee is confirming commitments from the government of the Yukon and the City of Whitehorse (CBC 12:30 pm)

Whitehorse is putting the finishing touches on its bid to host the 2027 Canada Winter Games. Today, the Bid Committee announced that it's confirming commitments from the Yukon government and the city. The committee will also submit an information package to he Canada Games Council this month. That package lays out its vision for the Games. That includes a recommendation to include arctic sports and Dene games, a trust fund for Indigenous sport, an athletes village that will turn into affordable housing, and a new rink that can host opening and closing ceremonies. The Canada Games Council will announce the host of the 2027 Games in November.

Chief Steve Smith of the Champagne and Aishihik First Nation will not seek re-election (CBC 12:30 pm)

The Champagne and Aishihik First Nation will be electing a new Chief and Council in about a month, but one familiar name will not be on the ballot. Steve Smith was first elected chief in 2014. Before that, he served two terms as a Councillor. Smith says he will not be running again. "Being a leader, you know, it's 24/7 so you don't always get the opportunities that you want to spend with your family. And so, you know, maybe taking a step back and doing some other things will allow certainly for myself and my wife to have the time to spend more time with our grandkids." Smith says he's proud of Champagne and Aishihik's language program. He says the First Nation has doubled its housing stock and built infrastructure. Election Day is October 20th.

To be eligible for a booster dose, six months must have passed since the completion of a primary series. In addition, for children who have recently had COVID-19, a booster is not recommended until at least three months have passed since symptoms started or testing positive. Whitehorse parents, guardians and caregivers can book appointments on <u>Yukon.ca/appointments</u> and people living in rural Yukon can phone their local health centre to book an appointment at the community clinics. For more information visit <u>yukon ca/this-is-our-shot</u>. This from Chief Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Sudit Ranade: "The risk of severe disease in children is very low and the booster provides added protection for some of our youngest Yukoners. Stay up to date on all COVID-19 vaccinations ensures the strongest protection against the virus. I encourage all Yukoners to get their booster when they become eligible."

Phase two of the Mental Wellness Summit will take place from September 21 to 23 (CHON 12:30 pm)

The government of Yukon announced the second phase of the 2022 Mental Wellness Summit. This is a joint release with the Council of Yukon First Nations. The Yukon government, in partnership with the Council of Yukon First Nations, is hosting this three day event. That will be a discussion on integration and innovation in mental wellness and substance use support. The summit will bring together local, national and international leaders, partners, Yukoners and people with lived and living experiences. This second phase follows a two day online Mental Wellness Summit held earlier his year. Presenters will cover a range of topics, including prevention, treatment, support services, aftercare and harm reduc ion models and solutions. The Yukon government and health system partners will also provide updates on the work underway to respond to the substance use health emergency declared earlier this year. The summit is free and anyone interested can participate virtually by registering online. All sessions will be recorded for online viewing after the summit sessions on Wednesday, September the 21st, and Thursday, September 22nd will run from 8:30 am to 5 pm. The summit will conclude with half a day on Friday, September the 23rd, from 8:30 am to 12 pm. Due to space limitations, in-person attendance at the summit is limited to invited guests. However, on September 21st and 22nd, evening sessions will be held at the Yukon Beringia Interpretive Centre from 6 pm to 9 pm. These

Mourners have started gathering at Westminster Hall for the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II (CKRW 12 pm)

Many of the first mourners allowed into London's Westminster Hall were in tears as they approached Queen Elizabeth's casket. Some tipped their hats and one person fell to one knee and blew a kiss. Britain's longest-serving monarch will lie in state for four days ahead of a state funeral on Monday. Thousands of people are already lined up down here along the River Thames to now see the queen lying in Westminster Hall. "I'm saddened, extremely saddened by the loss of Her Majesty. But I'm also very happy that we have our King." People are expected to wait many hours, some already waiting all night under the rain. People will be able to pass by the Queen's coffin 24 hours a day until Monday's funeral. Her coffin was brought to the House of Parliament from Buckingham Palace today in a solemn military procession. People have lined up for kilometres along the South Bank of the River Thames to pay their respects to Queen Elizabeth. Erin Hutchinson, who is originally from Guelph, Ontario, says she's preparing to stay all night if needed. She says it's important to mark the moments in history and pay tribute to the only monarch she and her family have ever known. The Queen's coffin will be on display for public viewing 24 hours a day until the morning of her funeral, which is set for Monday.

Whitehorse is putting the finishing touches on its bid to host the 2027 Canada Winter Games. Today, the Bid Committee announced that it's confirming commitments from the Yukon government and the city. The committee will also submit an informa ion package to the Canada Games Council this month. That package lays out its vision for the Games. That includes a recommendation to include arctic sports and Dene games, a trust fund for Indigenous sport, an athletes' village that will turn into affordable housing and a new rink that can host opening and closing ceremonies. The Canada Games Council will announce the host of the 2027 Games in November.

Their proposed store Community Cannabis is roughly 100 metres from a school according to territorial laws. That's about 50 metres too close. Jesse Dawson is a citizen of Kwanlin Dün First Nation. She spoke at a public hearing this week. She's urging the city not to change its bylaw, which is needed to see the project through. "Cannabis could cause impaired driving and there are also edible candies out there, including cookies and gummy bears. I am concerned that these may fall into the wrong hands." Dawson says she supports small business, but she says not a pot shop close to children and youth.

Hours of operation will be reduced at the Dawson City Museum during renovations (CBC 5:30 pm)

Sikanni Chief Bridge on the Alaska Highway reopens (CKRW 7 am)

Nearly three weeks after the Alaska Highway in northern British Columbia closed, the federal government is now allowing heavy trucks through. On August 25th, the Sikanni Chief Bridge, near Fort Saint John in Fort Nelson, BC, was shut down because of a collision causing a portion of the bridge and surrounding trees to be set ablaze. Steel says the farm hasn't operated since last fall. He says that's because of low turnout among citizens and no work plan. Steel says the First Nation hopes to have a new plan in place next month.

UPDATE: Sikanni Chief Bridge on the Alaska Highway reopens (CKRW 8 am)

The section of the Alaska Highway that has been closed for nearly three weeks in northern British Columbia is set to reopen to heavy trucks. The Sikani Chief Bridge was shut down on August he 25th because of an overturned semi-truck that smashed into the bridge that lit the surrounding trees and parts of the bridge on fire. The truck driver is thought to have died in the accident, according to the Fort Saint John RCMP statement. The day following the collision, Drive BC notes that as of September the 14th is still only available to single lane alternating traffic of cars weighing less than 15,500 kilos. And commercial trucks with weights below the restriction must be able to show weight slips in order to pass.

Some Yukoners are upset about the short notice for the statutory holiday on Monday (CBC 6:30 am)

Some Yukoners aren't happy that Monday is going to be a statutory holiday. The federal government has declared September 19th a holiday to mark Queen Elizabeth's funeral. She argued it violated her rights under the Canadian Charter. The case went to the Yukon Appeal Court before the Supreme Court of Canada. It highlights the intersection, overlap and conflict between Canadian and Indigenous law. Among the parties who have filed intervenor applications, the Attorneys General of Canada, Québec and Alberta, the Yukon government, the Métis Nation of Ontario and Carcross Tagish First Nation. The case is expected to be heard sometime next year.

Dear Minister LeBlanc and Minister St-Onge,

In 2007, Yukon hosted the Canada Winter Games in Whitehorse. This was the first time a sporting event of this magnitude was hosted in a territory, and represented a milestone for the Games as being a truly pan-Canadian celebration of sport. Still today, Yukon is the only territory north of 60 that has most of the required infrastructure in place to host the national level event.

The 2027 Canada Winter Games will feature the Yukon on the national stage, presenting a real opportunity to showcase the territory, our athletes, and First Nation culture, while highlighting the benefits of First Nation self-governance and showcasing ways to advance reconciliation. Through this opportunity, we can embrace for the first time the importance of First Nations in the Canada Winter Games, and no better place to do this than in the Yukon.

This letter is seeking financial support from the Government of Canada for specific components of a capital program that will enable Yukon to host the Games in 2027. These investments would not only enable Yukon to host the 2027 games alongside the City of Whitehorse, but more importantly will provide a lasting legacy that will benefit Yukoners for many years to come. Specifically, we are seeking support to construct an athletes' village that will become much needed affordable housing, for a new energy efficient arena complex, and for additional First Nation infrastructure investment. These legacy assets are only possible with strong and timely federal financial support for the Games.

Hosting the Canada Winter Games North in Yukon promises to showcase the North on a national stage, while meeting our common objectives through meaningful investments in legacy infrastructure that ensure timely delivery of green and social infrastructure, increasing potential for economic growth of small and medium size communities, supporting climate resilience, reducing emissions and creating jobs that improve Canadians' quality of life. Hosting the Games in Yukon will not only help athletes succeed at the highest levels of competition, but our bid is also focused on reconciliation with First

Nations, the addition of Arctic and Dene Sports to competition, and must include legacy considerations that aim to increase participation in sport with a particular focus on Indigenous Peoples.

Government of Yukon is projecting the capital cost of infrastructure required to host these Games to be \$187 million. While a small portion of this falls within the agreed upon funding formula for small jurisdictions in hosting major games, the vast majority of the capital program is related to infrastructure required to host the Games. We request that Canada consider a 75/25 cost share on the infrastructure components.

The table below outlines our request:

We seek an investment commitment from Canada for \$138 million over the next four years, which represents 75% of the projected infrastructure costs. Government of Yukon will commit up to \$49 million or 25% towards capital, and we are working with the City of Whitehorse to commit additional capital contribution towards the arena and sports facilities, in addition to assuming the ongoing operations and maintenance of sports facilities constructed in the municipality.

Reconciliation

The theme for the 2027 games is First Nation Reconciliation. Defining the needs and understanding the legacy for Yukon First Nations in sports facilities, cultural elements and legacy housing is critical to the bid. Ultimately, we are working to create a partnership with the Kwanlin Dün First Nation and Ta'an Kwäch'än Council, given the Games would be hosted within their traditional territories. The Bid Committee has included representation of the Council of Yukon First Nations in co-designing the details, along with collaboration with the First Nations. We envision a path where together we co-create the Games as something for us all to get behind. We have heard from Chief Doris Bill about the

importance that a sport like hockey has played in holding people up and the critical role of sport for mental health. With support from all levels of government we can imagine and realize benefits for our citizens and territory that will last well beyond the Games.

Yukon government is proud of our relationship with our Indigenous peoples and of their traditional territories that we call home. To celebrate this relationship, we intend to set a precedent for future Games by infusing Indigenous sport and culture into all aspects of the 2027 Games. We have proposed to add Arctic Sports and Dene Games to the formal Canada Games sport schedule. Strong federal financial support for the Games will bolster First Nation reconciliation and aid in meeting the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action on Sports and Reconciliation. We are confident that the legacy infrastructure will leave a legacy with our Indigenous youth that will help reduce barriers to sports participation, increase the pursuit of excellence in sport, and enhance capacity in our sport systems in order to be more inclusive of Indigenous peoples.

Here are some of the ways reconciliation is centered in planning for the Games, all of which are in active discussion with the Whitehorse-based First Nation governments:

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As part of our commitment to incorporate reconciliation into hosting the Games, we are proposing to include at least \$5 million in infrastructure upgrades to enhance an outdoor hockey rink facility and upgrades to gym space to improve spectator experience for Artic Sports and Dene Games.

Canada Games Village – Legacy value in additional units of affordable housing

In 2007, two athlete housing facilities were constructed for the Canada Winter Games at Yukon University. These facilities have since been transitioned to long-term student and low income senior housing. This is a model we plan to replicate.

To host the Games Yukon must provide lodging for athletes that meets or exceeds the Canada Winter Games standards, which can be done through repurposing some of the previous Games facilities. However, to address the current gap it is estimated to cost approximately \$67 million to develop the additional capacity for the Games Village. This investment will also include upgrades to water, sewer, district heat, and power supply at the eventual location. The bid committee is proposing that the athletes' village complex be located at Yukon University, and as was done in 2007 the housing would be built as affordable housing for students and seniors.

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Increased housing as a legacy of these games will reduce pressure on the housing market in Yukon – a critical step towards bolstering Yukon's housing deficit and a critical legacy of reconciliation from these games.

Arena Sports Complex – Legacy value in event, recreation and sport infrastructure to increase participation in sport for citizens and Indigenous peoples

The second category of community infrastructure that requires financial support is the development of an updated Arena Sports Complex. This will replace infrastructure that doesn't currently meet the

territory's current or future programming and hosting needs. As Yukon's population continues to grow at the fastest rate in the country, we are experiencing increasing demands on our recreation infrastructure. The planned Arena Sports Complex would provide legacy infrastructure to the Yukon beyond the Games. This would mean greater opportunities for youth, community exposure to more diverse sporting and cultural events, elite athlete development opportunities and economic benefits territory-wide with increased tourism.

Specific legacy aspects include improved hosting facilities for Artic Winter Games, enhanced facilities for the annual Native Hockey Tournament, larger sanctioned national tournaments, and a large venue for concerts, cultural events, and tradeshows. The current estimated cost of the sports complex is \$112 million.

Additional barriers must be overcome for the Games to be hosted in a smaller jurisdiction like Yukon. With your support we can ensure that the Canada Games are truly a pan-Canadian experience. With construction of the infrastructure required to host the Games will allow the City of Whitehorse to meet the needs of a growing population, to host Yukon-wide events that increase participation in sport for citizens of the territory, all while strengthening healthy and vibrant communities in the North.

I am hopeful that Canada will be able to see the great value in the opportunities with supporting these legacy investments. Officials will be reaching out to your offices in the coming days to establish a bilateral meeting for us to discuss this request. With your support, we also propose to set up a working group of our officials to formalize the arrangement and realize the opportunities to new and existing funding programs in support of our request.

Given that the bid must be submitted to the Canada Games Council by September 23, 2022, we are asking for an indication of support before that date. My officials will work expeditiously with your office to arrange bilateral discussions as follow-up.
